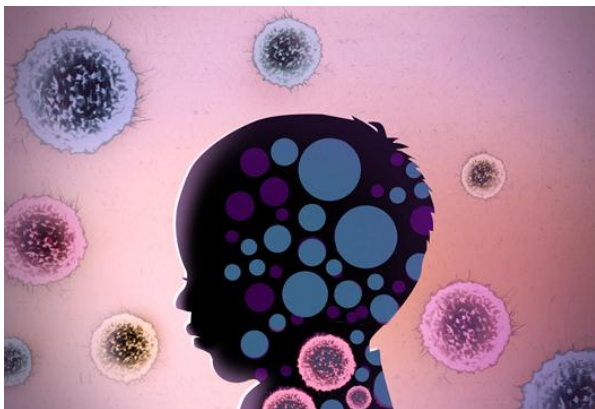

On July 20th, 1969 Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin became the first men to ever walk on the Moon. This act completed a dream first spoken by President John F. Kennedy 8 years earlier. It began with an appeal President John Kennedy made to a special joint session of Congress on May 25, 1961: "I believe this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to Earth." The reason had been because at the time, United States was in a cold war with the Soviet Union. The main point being the Space Race: the quest to reach and walk on the moon first.

Taking a total of eight years, and much hard work, it was one of the most important moments in human history and the 20th century. It was also a

televised event seen by more than a hundred million people. It showed both the power of human achievement and the mind. Never before or since have humans ever experienced such an integral moment.

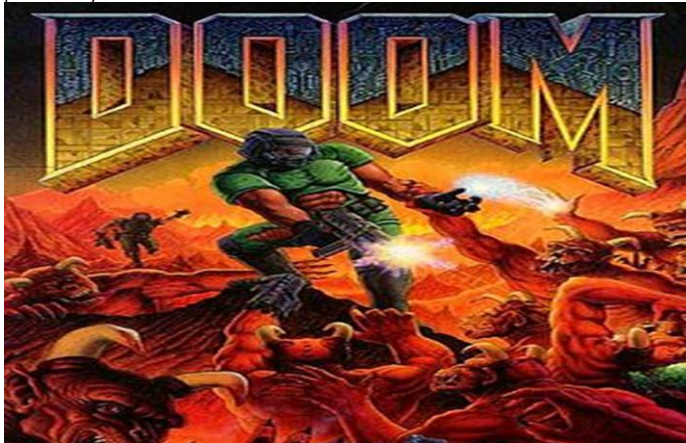

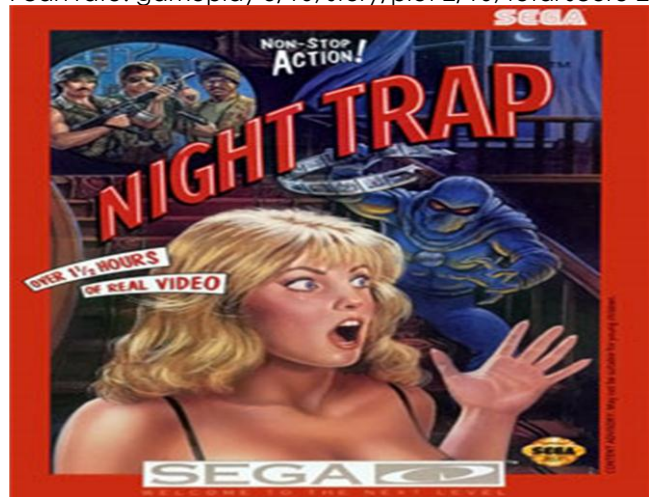
The Games that Gave Us the Rating System We Use Today

As you know today we have six types of ratings for video games. There was a time though when games had barely any ratings that would specify which games were appropriate for specific ages. The games that started this were: DOOM, Night Trap, Mortal Kombat.

DOOM is one of the first FPS'S or first person shooters. The game takes place on mars. You play as a space marine who has attacked his squad leader after being told to fire at civilians. He is sent to mars. His mission is to help in an experiment on the two moons of mars which most marines claim is boring, but, the experiment goes horribly wrong and the equipment malfunctions. Some strange creatures appear and start killing or possessing the other space marines. After a while your character is the last man standing. As I forgot to mention above, the experiment was a teleportation project but when it goes horribly wrong Deimos (one of the moons of mars the other being Phobos) disappears completely. So your character must fight for his survival and to prevent the creatures from getting to earth. The game is put into three sections called episodes with eight levels in each one. The first level is a military base on Phobos, the second being Deimos with strange architecture and a demonic field. After defeating the episode boss you land in hell only to discover that Deimos is floating above hell. The next episode begins with you fighting the demons of hell and after defeating Spiderdemon (the mastermind of the invasion), a portal to earth appears. After your character goes through the portal he appears in a lush meadow with flowers and rabbits only to see that a city is burning. A rabbits head is impaled on a stake leading to DOOM II: Hell on Earth. So what caused the rating controversy over this game? It had tons of blood and gore with graphic scenes, young kids could buy it when it was released in 1993. Though it and three other games caused the controversy it was a good game the graphics of an FPS at the time compared to today were horrible but, at the time they were good. The gameplay was pretty good, and the plot was okay. So here is my rating of DOOM: graphics: 7/10, gameplay: 9/10, and plot/story: 6/10 total score: 8/10.



Night Trap is the only one of the three to not have at least one sequel. The story is simple, a group of girls go over to their friend's house and you are part of a SCAT or Sega control attack team in the Sega version of the game. So one of the agents is a girl who is going to the party and the reason she is there is to investigate because a group of girls went there a few days before but never came back out. So, strange creatures known as Augers appear and try to take the girls away to suck their blood, but you stop them with traps that you see and activate through cameras in different rooms that you cycle from. Your character is referred to as control and you later find out that the family that lives in the house are vampires and that Augers need a lot of blood to become vampires. Depending on how you play and how many Augers you catch depends on the ending you get. So what was so controversial about it? Well, people claimed that it was inspiring children to hurt and kill real women, and there was a nightgown scene that was slightly transparent. So what is my rating, well the graphics I can't rate, it used real people because it was on the Sega CD but here is what I can rate: gameplay 3/10, story/plot 2/10, total score 2/10.



Mortal Kombat is a classic fighting game. There is not much to talk about in regards to the game, but it was released in 1992 and it was released for two separate consoles the Super Nintendo and the Sega Genesis. The Super Nintendo version was child friendly and so was the Sega Genesis version but, the Sega Genesis version had a secret password to type in and you could see all the blood and gore of it such as heads being kicked off, spines being ripped out, etc. So the game was not very child friendly when the code was put in, but, when the sequel came out Sega decided not to hide anything and show all the blood and gore. So that is how it helped start the rating controversy: graphics: 6/10 for Sega 7/10 for Nintendo, gameplay 8/10 for both, moves 9/10 for both. Total score 9/10 for Nintendo, 8.5/10 for Sega.

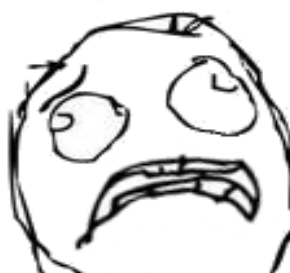
Me playing Slender late at night...

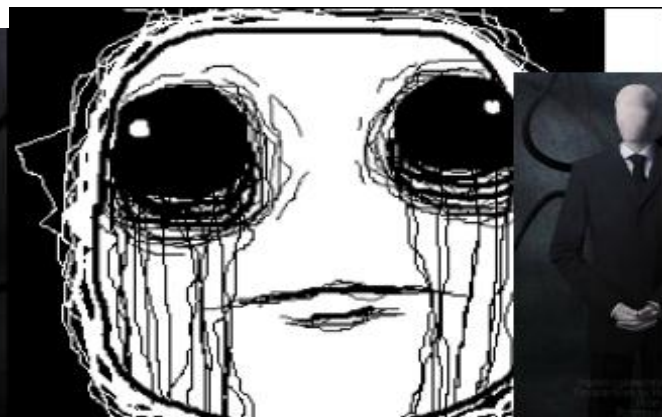


Me seeing Slender Man wallpaper
